Finding Connection and Meaning in a Lonely World



Loneliness is a feeling many of us know all too well. No matter who you are, the sense of isolation can creep in, leaving us

yearning for connection and meaning. Recent reports, including one by the Surgeon General, have highlighted that loneliness has become an epidemic in our society, touching people of all ages. It's affecting not just our emotional wellbeing but our physical and spiritual health, too. This echoes what many of us have felt in our hearts: a deep desire for community and purpose.

The good news? We don't have to face this loneliness alone. As it says in Ecclesiastes 4:9-10, "Two are better than one... If either of them falls down, one can help the other up."

The Bible reminds us of the importance of companionship. Jesus, in his earthly ministry, surrounded himself with friends, with his disciples, and regularly met with people from all walks of life. It's a beautiful example of how we are created to be in relationship with one another. When we reach out, we find we can lift each other up and provide strength in times of need.

Being part of a community, like our church, can make all the difference. Picture yourself sitting down for coffee with friends after a Sunday service, sharing stories, and laughter. Imagine being part of a small group Bible study, where you can learn more about God's Word while building meaningful relationships. Or think about serving on a ministry team together, whether it's helping in the community or organizing church events. These are just a few ways you can start to feel more connected and less alone.

For those who feel like life's meaning has become a little blurry, know that there is a place where you can belong. Being connected with others in a church setting not only helps combat loneliness but also helps us find purpose and direction. Whether you're a long-time member or someone curious about faith, our church doors are open to all seeking connection and meaning. We believe that everyone has a place here, and that together, we can create a community where no one feels alone.

New Sermon Series Addresses Epidemic of Loneliness

Observing the widespread and severe effects of social disconnection on Americans' health, Surgeon General Dr. Vivek Murthy says that "loneliness and isolation represent profound threats to our health and well-being." This reflects what our faith already teaches us: God created us for connection and community. Drawing on the experiences of the early church in scripture, our next sermon series will help us rediscover how God leads us into lives of meaningful relationship

with God and one another.

Starting September 8, we'll explore the theme of "Created for Connection" and identify strategies to help us grow in our relationships with God and others in Christian community. The weekly themes will be complemented with daily scripture readings and opportunities to get connected with one another in small groups for discipleship.

9/8: "Connection among Christians" – *Ephesians* 4:1-6

9/15: "Connection with God" – *John 15:1-12*

9/22: "Connection with Community" – *Hebrews* 10:23-25

9/29: "Connection across Barriers" – *Ephesians* 2:11-22

10/6: "Connection with the Larger Church" (World Communion) – *1 Corinthians* 10:16-17

comes from the lord alone."

Andy's excited to be back home at Monroe UMC. With his and Pastor Jeff's leadership, the prayer is that God will continue to send the Holy Spirit to work through us and encourage us to be His hands and feet while joyfully singing songs of praise to the God of second chances.

Church Finances - how we're doing the first seven months

Year All Giving General Fund Dedicated

2023 211,645 202,503 9,143

2024 234,950 167,552 67,398

The good news is we have responded to the ongoing maintenance needs; but the General Fund is too low. We need \$ 28,060 per month to meet budget needs. $$28,060 \times 7 = $196,420 - 167,552 = $28,868$ deficit. We have spent ~\$30K on maintenance already, with more to come. We are behind in apportionments and owe the IRS for accounting errors prior to Pastor Jeff's arrival.

We want to keep you informed of our needs and pray that we can get back on track. --Jerry Michael, Finance Chairman.

Air Conditioning & Safety System Update

We are grateful to God and to you for the abundant generosity we have seen in working with some major physical plant issues. The fire safety system upgrades are estimated to cost about \$15,000. (That work is now underway.) One AC unit for the back of the Sanctuary costs about \$11,000. (Two are needed plus one in the Narthex and one in the Student Wing.) As of the end of July, we have \$30,955.79 on hand. Thank you for considering any additional gift beyond

your regular offering or tithe you might give to help complete this portion of the work.

Then he looked in the seat behind him. He still couldn't find it.

The conductor said, "Dr. Einstein, I know who you are. We all know who you are. I'm sure you bought a ticket. Don't worry about it." The conductor continued down the aisle punching tickets. As he was ready to move to the next car, he turned around and saw the great physicist down on his hands and knees, looking under the seat for his ticket.

The conductor rushed back and said, "Dr. Einstein, Dr. Einstein, don't worry, I know who you are; no problem. You don't need a ticket. I'm sure you bought one." Einstein looked at him and said, "Young man, I too know who I am. What I don't know is where I'm going."

Billy Graham continued, "See the suit I'm wearing? It's a brand new suit. I bought a new suit for this luncheon and one more occasion. You know what that occasion is? This is the suit in which I'll be buried. But when you hear I'm dead, I don't want you to remember the suit I am wearing. I want you to remember this: I not only know who I am, I also know where I'm going.


