

Monroe United Methodist Church will celebrate its 200th anniversary on Sunday, September 17, with a special service and luncheon. The worship service is planned for 10:00 am in the Sanctuary and will include special music, scripture, prayer, sharing, and praise to our faithful God. A free luncheon will follow at about 11:45 am. in Atchley Hall. The main dish and dessert are provided; attendees are encouraged to bring a dish to share and table service.

When Methodist local preacher Nathaniel Sackett, known to area residents as "Father Sackett," began holding services in his home, I wonder what he imagined God would do through



Methodists in this community. Interest increased and by 1823, a class was organized by Mr. and Mrs. Isaac Conover, Mr. and Mrs. John Younk, Mrs. Ulm, Mrs. Floyd, Mrs. Joseph Alexander, and G. P. Williamson with Father Sackett's help. What did those first nine Methodists hope God would bring from their efforts? Soon, they moved from Sackett's home to an old log schoolhouse on the corner of Elm and East Streets. Membership increased as Mr. and

Mrs. B. Magie, Mr. and Mrs. T. Armor, and the whole family of Mr. Borders, and others joined the class; soon they numbered 35 and set about to build a new building. In the meantime, they also held services in the local carpenter shop, cabinet shop, log schoolhouse, and other "movable tabernacles." Then, as now, the church's ministry relied on the dedicated leadership and service of laypersons.

Worshipers soon raised funds to build a frame church building on our present site, and Monroe Methodist Episcopal Church with Rev. Maley of the Miami Circuit as pastor. The congregation grew until membership topped 100 in 1860 and a larger building was built.

Could Father Sackett or those original class members have imagined more than 100 Methodists, several worshiping locations, and two church buildings within the lifetimes of their children and grandchildren? Could they have pictured a larger building and nearly 400 members 200 years after they first gathered?

They could not have dreamed of rapid travel and distances covered daily with cars. They had no idea the abundance of food available. They had no inkling of digital communication and ministry. They did not imagine their town of twenty houses and two stores would grow to include 15,489 people living in 5,562 households. There is so much they could not picture.

What they could foresee, however, was that the light of Jesus Christ would shine through them from this hilltop throughout the flourishing Monroe community. They knew that, as they faithfully shared their witness to God's work in their lives and lifted up the name of Jesus Christ, others would be drawn to Christ and give their lives to him. They knew that, as they remained connected to Jesus Christ, he would bear fruit in and through their lives.

Yet, because of their faith in God and their cooperation with our faithful God, with whom all things are possible (Matthew 19:26), we are yet alive to reflect on these first 200 years of God's movement among people called Methodists in Monroe.

Today we, the people known as Monroe UMC, are yet alive because of the faithfulness of our spiritual forebears and the firm foundation they built for us on Jesus Christ our Lord. To us they pass the torch and the responsibility to steward God's dream for a community of faith "shining the light on the hill by connecting with God, connecting with each other, and connecting with the world."

We don't know what God will do over the next 200 years of our history, and yet we are sure that God will work in, through, and if necessary, in spite of us to produce a harvest of righteousness, grace and love.

Let us take up the cross till we the crown obtain, and gladly reckon all things loss so we may Jesus gain.*

Medical equipment available

As many of you may remember our church has a medical equipment loaner program. If you need a piece of medical equipment temporarily while waiting to get your own, need to borrow something for yourself or a friend or need it permanently just to make life a little easier we are here to help you. We accept donations of clean equipment in good condition when you no longer need it. Some items presently available are Walkers, crutches, wheelchairs, canes, bedside commodes, shower chairs, raised toilet seats, easy shampoo gadget, bed rail, transfer belts, lumbar cushion, food tray- fits on walker, bed underpays & a few adult briefs. Also, just a reminder. The AED (automatic external defibrillator) is centrally located on the wall in the case outside the church office, at the top of the steps coming up from Atchley Hall. Don't be afraid to use it if someone becomes unresponsive and you can't feel a pulse. Send someone for the AED, call 911, and start CPR! Once you open up the AED, turn it on and it will tell you what to do.

We also have a very well stocked First Aide bag on the table under the church mailboxes in the same area as the AED. If you notice it's missing anything or supplies are low, please contact Pam Kilburn.



HISTORY CORNER

"Shining the Light on the Hill Since 1823"



Many things have changed around us but especially in thelife of thisand other churches.

Today we are known as "Shining the Light on the Hill" but in the late 1800s when this photograph was taken, we were known for the steeple that stood high on the same hill.

The first building was a log cabin at 127 South Street - present-day Lebanon Street. Later a frame building was erected at the end of Center Street - present-day Church Street - and East Avenue. By the mid-1850s the membership had grown to over one hundred, and more space was needed. In 1860, that building was razed, and a new brick church was completed in 1861.

The 1861 building is the building seen in the two photographs shared here.

I used to belong to a church who had a 100-year history. They always talked about "Linking the

Past to the Present for the Future." Kind words, but they had to merge with another church and have had to give up much of their past. Change came.

I enjoy investigating local history and especially enjoy trying to determine what is going on in old photographs but we as a church need to pay much attention to God's plan for us in the future. The past is over, and we cannot relive it. Hopefully, we have learned from the past and can use that to help decidethe future. Change has always happened and is with us today. We mustaccept it and move forward.
